Questo oblio fa sì che gli aspiranti scrittori possano ispirarsi solo a modelli esteri, trascurando autori e autrici italiani che non sono approdati alla grande editoria. Uno di questi casi è lo scrittore triestino Livio Horrakh, nato nel 1946 e vincitore, tra l'altro, della prima edizione del Premio Italia (1972) nella categoria racconto. Leggere oggi Horrakh significa scoprire che ha scritto un racconto cyberpunk quattro anni prima di Johnny Mnemonic di Gibson, che in un altro anticipa di 15 anni Cecità di Saramago, che i suoi romanzi pubblicati dopo il 2017 per case editrici minori sono opere incredibili che mescolano mondi paralleli, fisica quantistica, fantapolitica, viaggi nel tempo, musica degli anni Cinquanta e religioni orientali! Questa antologia contiene tutti i racconti pubblicati da Livio Horrakh tra il 1968 e il 2003, per rimediare all'oblio prima che sulla fantascienza italiana sia fatto il buio. Livio Horrakh ha esordito con la fanzine triestina di fantascienza Decimo pianeta (1966-1967); ha pubblicato i primi racconti, influenzati dalla new wave britannica e dalla letteratura beat, su Galassia, la collana da edicola della casa editrice La Tribuna. Insegna Traduzione specializzata presso la facoltà per traduttori e interpreti dell'università di Trieste, collabora con diverse testate giornalistiche e pubblica testi tecnici sulla materia che insegna; suoi racconti e sceneggiature radiofoniche sono andati in onda sulla rete Rai regionale del Friuli-Venezia Giulia. Le pubblicazioni si sono fatte progressivamente rarefatte negli anni Ottanta, ma dal 2017 è tornato a pubblicare tre romanzi che dimostrano la sua capacità di rinnovare i modelli narrativi della SF e di tenersi aggiornato sulle evoluzioni scientifiche e tecnologiche. Livio Horrakh è stato tradotto e pubblicato in Germania, Francia, Grecia, Ungheria, Cina e USA.

Can justice be forced on individuals and communities? The essays in this collection by Henry David Thoreau urge us to consider the difficult matter of how to counter the specific injustice manifested in the practice of buying and selling human beings and how to implement laws and practices that help establish justice. Of the many philosophical ideas Thoreau explores, the central concern is how to end slavery and provide justice for all. It is no surprise to find Thoreau defending the idea of civil disobedience, but his defense of John Brown, who used violence, including murder, commands our attention. The Civil Rights movement of the 1960s and 1970s in the U.S. was heavily influenced by the rhetoric, the actions, and the overall philosophy of Martin Luther King, Jr., who famously combined civil disobedience and nonviolent action under the strong influence of Mohandas K. Gandhi. Although Gandhi staunchly defends and promotes the use of nonviolence, he is quick to condemn inaction as an even greater evil than violence. If forced to choose between doing nothing and using violence, he would choose violence; but his many writings and speeches are designed to show that

we almost always have a nonviolent alternative to oppose injustice and foster justice. The lives of more than a billion residents of India have been profoundly shaped by the ideas Gandhi presents and defends in these selections from MY NONVIOLENCE. The liberation of India from British colonialism and the establishing of what Gandhi called \"home rule\" is powerful evidence of the role nonviolence can play in bringing about justice and eliminating injustice. Gandhi addresses not only matters of race and skin color but also the caste system and the social stratification that currently pervade the entire globe. These works by Thoreau and Gandhi consider the best way to promote justice and goodness not in utopia but in the actual world where we live. The primary goal of Agora Publications is not to answer such controversial questions by taking sides but to provide access to philosophical works that promote such dialogue. Henry David Thoreau (July 12, 1817 -May 6, 1862) was an American philosopher who wrote about nature, social and political issues, and human existence in general. He worked closely with other transcendentalist thinkers such as Ralph Waldo Emerson and Margaret Fuller. Thoreau is best known for his book Walden, a reflection upon simple living in natural surroundings; his essay \"Civil Disobedience\" offers arguments for disobedience to an unjust state. Mohandas K. Gandhi (October 2, 1869 - January 30, 1948) was an Indian philosopher who was formally educated as a lawyer. He initially taught and practiced nonviolent resistance in South Africa and then led the successful campaign for India's independence from British rule. His actions and his writings inspired movements for civil rights and freedom throughout the globe.

Typhoon

A key text by a leading figure in Italian socialist feminism that remains relevant today, addressing the exploitation of women in the workplace and at home. Anna Kuliscioff (ca. 1854-1925) was a prominent figure in the revolutionary politics of her era, advocating for socialism and feminism. One of the founding members of the Italian Socialist Party, she actively contributed to the late-nineteenth-century flourishing of the Socialist International and the emergence of Italian socialism. For the last decades of her life, Kuliscioff's public militancy revolved around the \"woman question.\" She viewed feminism through the lens of class struggle, addressing the double exploitation of women--in the workplace and at home. Kuliscioff fought a twofold battle: as a socialist, she unmasked the sexism of her colleagues; as a feminist, she criticized liberal-bourgeois feminism. In this key text, she makes her case for a socialist feminism. Originating as a lecture Kuliscioff delivered in April 1890 at a meeting of the the Milan Philological Circle (which denied

membership to women), The Monopoly of Man explicitly links feminism to labor. Kuliscioff argues that labor frees women from the prison of the household and potentially fosters their emancipation; she advances the principle of equal pay for equal work. She declares that woman is enslaved by both her husband and by capital, calls marriage a form of women's servitude, and demands that motherhood be better appreciated as work. It is only when woman is economically independent and resists capitalism, she argues, that she will achieve freedom, dignity, and the respect of man.

Captain William Kidd

In 1951 the Australian writers Charmian Clift and George Johnston left grey, post-war London for Greece. Settling first on the tiny island of Kalymnos, then Hydra, their plan was to live simply and focus on their writing The result is Charmian Clift's best known and most loved books, Mermaid Singing and Peel Me a Lotus. Peel Me a Lotus, the companion volume to Mermaid Singing, relates their move to Hydra where they bought a house and grappled with the chaos of domestic life whilst becoming the center of an informal bohemian community of artists and writers. That group included Leonard Cohen, who became their lodger, and his girlfriend Marianne Ihlen Clift paints an evocative picture of the characters and sun-drenched rhythms of traditional life, long before backpackers and mass tourism descended.

The Stolen Girl
